President's Column

All is well with Niños Adelante in Zihuatanejo. Jose is busy with administering all the changes for the new school year. We had graduating classes in 2014 of 16 high school students and 14 colleges students and continue to have approximately 225 kids in the program for the coming school year.

Thanks to you, we continue to educate some of the brightest kids in the Zihua area.

I recently came across an old newsletter article written by Ty Bujold, one of our past presidents. Ty wrote this column for the newsletter back in the summer of 2000. Just for fun, I have decided to re-print Ty's column. Here it is exactly as he wrote it 14 years ago:

A Word from the President...Ty Bujold

I am often asked (two times in the last year, at least) what it is like to be the CEO of a several thousand dollar per year non-profit corporation whose expenses are roughly equal to its income. People will say, "Ty, how do you handle the stress? And what are your dreams of the future?" Of course, the easy answer is that I do precious little as CEO, relying upon a highly paid secretary (Adrienne Baldwin), treasurer (Delia Bujold), and vice-president (Carol Tierney). I'm pretty much a ribbon-cutter when the company opens a new operation. But that's the easy answer. The hard answer involves a modicum of dissembling, some vagueness, and occasionally outright fabrication. I say things like, "Maximizing return for our investors is my first thought every day. Reducing staff wherever possible isn't cruelty, it's tough love. In the competitive market where we find ourselves, it's not easy to up those expenses, deal with high executive compensation, and keep the ship on an even keel."

But lately, the press has been hard at work on my case. One rag recently wrote: "Bujold has justified his do-nothing approach to management by pointing to his annual salary, saying that a lot of similarly ineffective presidents are paid a lot more. But his critics quickly respond that the right thing for Bujold to do would be to move from his current executive compensation package, claimed to be zero-based, to a negative numbers situation where he would be assessed annually a fee to compensate stockholders for the corporation's failure to make a profit through its first year of existence."

A mean-spirited press will not deter me. I intend to run again for office this year and if elected by our Board, I will continue undaunted in my efforts to keep this company a profitless venture,

focusing on the fact that despite my indolence we have once again kept over 100 Mexican kids in school, have a loyal following of donors whose enthusiasm for what I do not do is unbridled, and have a Board of Officers, not one of whom has been indicted.

I thought this well written column was worth repeating. It is "tongue in cheek" at best, but reminds me of the time and effort that was put into our organization by some very talented people, many years ago. Ty's comment about our first year of operation refers to the fact that we had just become a 501 (c) (3) organization...thanks to his efforts in making it happen.

Mike and Kathy Gallagher Scholarship Fund

Purpose:

Provide a significant grant to an outstanding Niños Adelante graduating high school senior each year who has been accepted to attend a major university in Mexico.

Scope:

All students meeting our eligibility criteria who are planning to go away to a major university or college in Mexico to earn a Bachelor's degree are encouraged to submit an application. High School Seniors are eligible to apply and all applications must be received by July 1st. The winning applicant will be selected from the applicants by the Niños Adelante Scholarship Committee.

- 2. High School senior graduates of Niños Adelante Program (3 years minimum in the program and graduate of public high school)
- 3. Committed to earning a four-year college degree at a significant university outside of Guerrero (excepting Chilpancingo)

- 5. G.P.A. of 9.3 at end of Junior year (to be maintained during Senior year)

Sanderson Scholarship Fund

Scope:

All students meeting our eligibility criteria who are planning to go away to a major Federal or State university or college in Mexico to earn a Bachelor's degree in engineering are encouraged to submit an application. High School Seniors are eligible to apply and all applications must be received by July 1st. The winning applicant will be selected from the applicants by the Niños Adelante Scholarship Committee.

Eligibility Criteria:

- 1. Strong moral character
- 2. High School senior graduates of Niños Adelante Program (3 years minimum in the program and graduate of public high school)
- 3. Committed to earning a four-year college degree in an engineering field at a significant university outside of Guerrero (excepting Chilpancingo)
- 4. Willing to share their personal story.
- 5. G.P.A. of 9.3 at end of Junior year (to be maintained during Senior year)

Grant:

A grant of \$2,000 USD per year for five years will be administered beginning with acceptance to university and continue annually for a total of five years upon successful completion of each year with a minimum G.P.A. of 8.0. Payment of the grant during each year will be as follows: One half at the beginning of each school year and one half in January of each year.

2014 Scholarship Awards

This year the Mike and Kathy Gallagher scholarship has been awarded to Elidet Rodriguez

Thanks to a generous gift from the Gallaghers, Friends of Niños Adelante is able this year to offer a scholarship grant of \$1500 per year for four years of successful university study to an outstanding young woman, Elidet Rodriguez Fuerte. The following is Elidet's translated letter included in her application to the committee



My name is Elidet Rodriguez Fuerte, I am 21 years old. I was born in the mountains of Petatlan, and have eight brothers and sisters:

My brother Nicasio (24 years) is a college student at the Technology University Costa Grande in Zihuatanejo as an accountant. He also works as an accountant. My brother David (23) can not hear or speak and he is working in Ixtapa Zihuatanejo. My sister Norma (19) just finished high school and entered Technology University to study accounting as well.

My brother Jose Daniel (16 years) is studying ninth grade Audel (14 years) is studying ninth grade in school Eva Samano, Yanet (12)is studying eighth grade Diana (7 years) is studying second grade.

My father was a farmer. Where we lived in the mountains it was difficult to study because there were no teachers. Some teachers were sent to teach but then returned to the village after a few months. It was difficult to finish the years classes. My parents decided to look for more opportunities for us to continue studying. First we settled in Petalan and then later in Zihuatanejo where we enrolled in primary school in third and fourth grade with my sister Norma. My father found work in a tortilla mill. My mom searched for a way to put a roof over our heads. Through Fibazi (they control the land use in Zihuatanejo)she was able to obtain a piece of land where my father could build a wooden house for us. We went to live there and that was when we entered the primary Octavio Paz near my house. We completed 5th and 6th grade but when we finished elementary my dad did not want us to study anymore because my family is low income. It was then that teacher Maria commented to Maryellen Jackson who spoke with my dad to tell him we had earned good grades, she would support us to continue our education. My father accepted and I continued studying in secondary school at Carolina Coronado Ramirez and finished secondary school. Then I went to study at the Sor Juana Ines de la Cruz school. My classes were in the afternoon so in the morning I studied a nursing course and a first aid course.

I just finished high school and want to continue studying college to get a degree in nursing and then do a masters in nursing and then to teach nursing. I am very proud to be a Niños Adelante Student, and very grateful for the support I have had. I am looking forward to University in Acapulco to further my education. My average is 9.4 on a scale of 10. Thank you very much.

College Students of Niños Adelante - Reaching for the Stars


